# Regular Meeting City Hall, Marysville, Kansas-July 12, 2021

Members of the Governing Body of the City of Marysville were called to order in regular session at 7:00 p.m. on the date and place noted above with Mayor Barnes in the chair. City Administrator St. John, and City Clerk Holle were also present.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, roll call was answered by the following council members: Pippia, Frye, Schroller, Hughes, Beikman, Price, Behrens and Throm. A quorum was present.

The minutes from the June 28<sup>th</sup> regular meeting were presented for approval. CM Throm moved, CM Behrens seconded to approve the minutes as presented. Motion carried by 8-0 voice vote.

# **PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

**CONDEMNED PROPERTY 205 N. 10<sup>TH</sup> ST-JULIE MURPHY.** Julie Murphy owner of the property at 205 N. 10<sup>th</sup> Street, asked if there would be another hearing on the property. She was told all the hearings have been completed and the property has been condemned. She asked if demolition would start soon and said she would like to sort through the property inside the apartment building for the next month. Julie said she should have everything she wanted to keep off the property in 30 days.

**JOE COHORST-PROPERTY AT 616 BROADWAY.** Joe Cohorst the previous owner of the property at 616 Broadway which the City purchased and the closing date is July 12, asked if he could remove some property from inside the business. He would like to remove a few more large items. CA St. John said Inline would most likely not be on site this week for the demolition. Joe said he would have the items removed by the end of the week. He will contact City Attorney McNish about signing the closing papers.

# **BUSINESS AND DISCUSSION ITEMS:**

1. THE WALL THAT HEALS-DEAN THOMAS. Dean Thomas a representative from the Legion Committee in charge of the Wall That Heals asked the City to supply 2 porta potties for August 25-30. The City will also provide cones and or barricades for traffic control. The Fire Department and the Police Department will assist in traffic control. Dean asked if Musco Lighting would be constructing the new light at Feldhausen Field in August. CA St. John said he had spoken with Musco Lighting, and they would not be working when the Wall That Heals is here. Dean said they would like to use ATVs and golf carts to shuttle people from the parking area if they have difficulty walking. CM Throm moved to allow the committee to use ATVs and golf carts on the street for this event, CM Behrens seconded. Motion carried unanimously. A map of the requested parking area was presented. The north entrance to Feldhausen Field will be used for emergency entrance and exit and no parking will be allowed near that entrance. CM Throm moved to approve Resolution 2021-07 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING TEMPORY NO PARKING AND INSTALLATION OF TEMPORARY NO-PARKING SIGNS ON THE EAST SIDE OF VETERANS MEMORIAL DRIVE SOUTH OF FELDHAUSEN FIELD TO CAROLINA STREET, FROM THE EAST SIDE OF 19<sup>TH</sup> STREET FROM LARAMIE STREET SOUTH TO THE ALLEY, AND THE SOUTH SIDE OF CAROLINA STREET FROM VETERANS MEMORIAL DRIVE TO 20<sup>TH</sup> STREET IN THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, CM Behrens seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

# 2. BLACK SQUIRREL BARK PARK ALCOHOL CONSUMTION ON CITY PROPERTY.

McKenzie Maddox a member of the Black Squirrel Bark Park Committee requested the City allow alcohol consumption on City property near the entry to the proposed dog park on the south side of Jackson Street near the 7<sup>th</sup> Street intersection. The Bark Park Committee is conducting a fund raiser on July 23, 2021. The area will be barricaded, they will display signage and the event is for participants who are 21 years or older. CM Frye moved to allow alcohol consumption in the barricaded area on Jackson Street July 23, 2021, from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m., CM Pippia seconded. Motion carried 7-1 with CM Throm voting no.

## 3. CHAMBER/MAIN STREET SQUIRREL CRAWL ALCOHOL CONSUMPTION ON

**CITY PROPERTY AND STREET CLOSING.** Kate Tommer from the Chamber/Main Street organization requested the City close the alley between 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Street from the northeast corner of the Helvering Center through the northeast side of S. 7<sup>th</sup> Street. S. 7<sup>th</sup> Street from Elm to Broadway the east side only. They also would like to block the entire City parking lot behind the Helvering Center. They will start setting up in the morning and would like these areas blocked from 4:00 p.m. until 11 p.m. for the event. They will use the downtown speaker system from 4:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. The City will provide 6 barricades and 4 trash barrels which the committee will set-up. This event is the annual Squirrels Just Wanna Have Fun ladies' night out "Squirrel Crawl" and will be held on August 13, 2021. The committee asks the City to allow alcohol consumption in the barricaded area, with signage displayed and the event will be attended by participants who are 21 years or older. CM Throm moved to approve the Chamber/Main Street requests for August 13, 2021, CM Pippia seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

- 4. FOUL BALL NET AT LAKEVIEW. BI Will Ralph presented a plan to install foul ball protection surrounding the 3 diamonds at the Lakeview Complex. The representative from Gourock, which is the company that will make the nets to size and shape, recommended the use of foul ball protection fabric and not shaded foul ball fabric because of the large amount of wind at the Lakeview Complex. The City staff will install the netting system with concrete footings and the poles bolted into place. The nets should be installed before the MHS spring softball season and will be removed each fall for storage. CM Throm moved to purchase the foul ball protection nets from Gourock for Lakeview Complex for \$5,260.47 including shipping and the support poles from Landoll Company, LLC for \$3,498.00. This will be paid from the General Fund, Recreation Improvements. CM Behrens seconded. Motion carried unanimously.
- 5. RESOLUTION 2021-08 NUISANCE AT 905 CALHOUN. BI Ralph presented pictures and the Notice of Violation for 905 Calhoun owned by Daniel Busby. Daniel Busby did not request a hearing, nor did he appear on July 12, 2021. The City has abated nuisances on this property several times in the past. CM Throm moved, CM Beikman seconded to approve Resolution 2021-08 setting a deadline of July 22, 2021, for the owner to abate the nuisance. Following July 22, the City will abate the nuisance and assess the costs to Daniel Busby. Motion carried unanimously.

- 6. RESOLUTION 2021-09 NUISANCE AT 504 SPRING. BI Ralph presented pictures and the Notice of Violation for 504 Spring owned by Roger Miller. Roger Miller did not request a hearing, nor did he appear on July 12, 2021. It was noted this property has a privacy fence which had partly fallen at the time of the pictures, but according to the City Code a nuisance may not be kept behind a privacy fence. CM Beikman moved, CM Throm seconded to approve Resolution 2021-09 setting a deadline of July 22, 2021, for the owner to abate the nuisance. Following July 22, the City will abate the nuisance and assess the costs to Roger Miller. Motion carried unanimously.
- 7. RESOLUTION 2021-10 NUISANCE AT 408 N. 9<sup>TH</sup> STREET. BI Ralph presented pictures and the Notice of Violation for 408 N. 9<sup>th</sup> Street owned by Alina Shortle and occupied by Damon Scott. Alina Shortle or Damon Scott did not request a hearing, nor did they appear on July 12, 2021. CM Throm moved, CM Pippia seconded to approve Resolution 2021-10 setting a deadline of July 22, 2021, for the owner to abate the nuisance. Following July 22, the City will abate the nuisance and assess the costs to Alina Shortle. Motion carried unanimously.
- 8. RESOLUTION 2021-11 REGARDING INTENT TO LEVY A PROPERTY TAX EXCEEDING THE REVENUE NEUTRAL RATE. CA St. John presented a resolution 2021-11. A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS REGARDING THE GOVERNING BODY'S INTENT TO LEVY A PROPERTY TAX EXCEEDING THE REVENUE NEUTRAL RATE. The RNR for the City is 66.37 mills and the proposed mill levy will be capped at a maximum of 67.64 mills. A public hearing regarding the City's intent to exceed the RNR will be held August 9 at 7:00 p.m. at the City Hall. CM Throm moved to approve Resolution 2021-11, CM Behrens seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

# **NOTICES AND HEARINGS:**

**CONSENT AGENDA.** The Consent Agenda was presented for consideration. CM Throm moved, CM Frye seconded to approve the Consent Agenda. Motion carried unanimously. The Consent Agenda consisted of the following:

- 1. MCAC -Request to serve alcohol at an Art Reception September 11, 2021, at Lee Dam Art Center.
- **2.** Kathryn Kirchhoff -Request to serve alcohol at a family reunion September 25, 2021, at Lee Dam Art Center from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
- **3.** City Clerk's Report for June showed \$28,736.03 collected in receipts with a like amount being deposited with the City Treasurer.
- 4. Cash balances in funds as of June 30, 2021, were presented as well as outstanding debt and receivable balances. Revenue/Expenditure Budget Reports through June 2021 showed unadjusted accumulated revenues in the General Fund of \$2,008,140 or 78% of budget; Water Revenue Fund, \$385,398 or 43% of budget, Sewer Revenue Fund, \$388,917 or 51% of budget. Unadjusted statement of expenditures in the General Fund totaled \$1,529,071 or 47% of budget,

Water Revenue Fund, \$563,882 or 35% of budget, and Sewer Revenue Fund, \$685,829 or 32% of budget.

**5.** Municipal Judge's Report for June showed \$1,150.00 being deposited with the City Treasurer and \$47.00 being forwarded to the State Treasurer for Judicial Branch Education, court costs and law enforcement training.

# **APPROPRIATIONS ORDINANCE NO. 3751**

- Claims against the funds of the City were submitted for Council consideration as follows: General Fund, \$118,911.61; Water Revenue Fund, \$103,469.07; Sewage Revenue Fund, \$74,602.14; Sewer Replacement, \$16,451.97; Bond & Interest #1, \$120,237.50; Library Revolving Fund, \$9,866.06; Swim Pool Sales Tax \$25,309.78; Special Law Enforcement, \$480.00; Koester Block Maintenance, \$1,104.15; Employee Benefit, \$31,608.94; Transient Guest Tax, \$5,053.41; Sales Tax Improvements, \$37,109.09; making a total of \$544,203.72.
- 2. An appropriations ordinance was introduced and considered to honor claims against the funds of the City as audited by the Finance Committee. CM Throm moved, CM Behrens seconded to approve the appropriations ordinance totaling \$544,203.72.
- **3.** Motion to approve the appropriations ordinance carried by 8-0 roll call vote. City Clerk Holle assigned Ordinance No. 3751.

# **CITY ADMINISTRATOR:**

- 1. NUISANCE BUILDINGS-SHERIFF AUCTION. CA St. John spoke with County Attorney Jason Brinegar. Brinegar informed CA St. John the property at 1205 Carolina will be on the next Sheriff Auction at the end of the year. 205 N. 10<sup>th</sup> Street will not be on the next Sheriff Auction. After Council discussion about the City's ability to recover the demolition costs at the Sheriff Auction, and the current bid to remove the structure by Kruse Dozing, CM Price moved to abate the nuisance and demolish the structure at 1205 Carolina pending verification with Kruse Dozer that they will honor the bid of \$10,000. CM Beikman seconded. Motion carried 5-3 with CM Frye, CM Schroller and CM Hughes voting no.
- 2. FINANCIALS. CA St. John updated the governing body on the status of General Fund, Water Revenue Fund, Sewer Revenue Fund and Sales Tax Improvement Fund. A Capital Projects report was also included.

#### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 11-101 OF THE 2020 CODE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE.

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS:

**Section 1.** Section 11-101 of the 2020 Code of the City of Marysville hereby is amended to read as follows:

#### 11-101. INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE ORDINANCE.

There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Marysville, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities," edition of 2021, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. No fewer than three copies of the Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 1901, "with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance and filed with the City Clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

**Section 2.** Ordinance 1892 and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and they are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 1902**

#### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 14-101 OF THE 2020 CODE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS.

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS:

**Section 1.** Section 14-101 of the 2020 Code of the City of Marysville hereby is amended to read as follows:

14-101. INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE. There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Marysville, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the "Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities," edition of 2021, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. No fewer than three copies of the Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 1902," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance and filed with the City Clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours. The police department, municipal judge and all administrative departments of the city, such number of official copies of the Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked, as may be deemed expedient.

Section 2. Ordinance 1881 and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and they are hereby repealed.

**Section 3.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city newspaper.

#### AGREEMENT

**THIS AGREEMENT** made and entered into this 26th day of July 2021 by and between the City of Marysville, Kansas, as party of the first part, and B & W Electric, Russell Behrends, as party of the second part.



The following is an update on Marysville Chamber & Main Street's previous six months of service and activities for the community.

Chamber & Main Street co-sponsored the **Legislative Forum** on March 20th with Landoll Company. This gave our business members and the community an opportunity to hear from Senator Bowers & Representative Lisa Moser.

The Chamber & Main Street Retail Committee hosted **Shamrock Marysville** on March 13. This was our 2nd year for the retail event - designed to promote specials in conjunction with St. Patrick's Day, kick off retail shopping for the spring, and get those cash registers ringing. We were pleased to see local participation as well as shoppers from surrounding communities. Chamber & Main Street provided \$200 worth of Chamber Bucks, in various amounts, to help boost local participation. With the local mask mandate still in effect, we were still able to provide a great event while promoting a safe shopping experience.

**Mother's Day Market** was organized as a joint effort between Marysville Chamber & Main Street and other local organizations, The proceeds from the annual Mother's Day Market and the Chicken BBQ are donated to the Koester House Museum & Gardens. While there were some hiccups with the BBQ this year, the Chamber & Main Street board and director used some quick, creative thinking, and pure genuine ingenuity to alter the menu, prepare and serve food, and raise more funds than in previous years!

The Big Blue River Days festival, best known for the Big Blue BBQ and Car Show, occurs annually the first weekend in June. The Big Blue BBQ, primarily driven by the Chamber & Main Street director and board members, alongside other active community volunteers, had 26 teams participate in the KCBS sanctioned contest. Teams traveled from Oklahoma & Missouri to participate. In conjunction with the Car Show, this event brought in close to 5,000 people, over doubling the population fo our our town that weekend! This event fills up our hotels and camp sites, and encourages people to eat and shop local. Smaller events and activities are hosted throughout the weekend, including Friday Night Poker Run & Cruise Night, the ever-popular Beer Mile, and a cornhole tournament. Live entertainment is provided both Friday & Saturday night, drawing a crowd downtown. On Saturday, local eatery, El Ranchero was permitted to set up a taco stand - which they said helped their sales tremendously! The proceeds from the event assist with operations for the Chamber & Mainstreet organization.

**Squirrels Just Wanna Have Fun** will celebrate its 5th year, this year! The annual "Squirrel Crawl" is a "ladies night" event. In 2019 approximately 140 women participated. In 2020 that number grew to 164 participants. This year, our goal is to reach 200 participants! We work closely with the local businesses and organizations to provide a great ladies night event while providing a unique opportunity for our business owners to increase their number of sales. Each

business who agrees to be a 'stop' provides discounted items, snacks, drinks, door prizes, and fun for all participants. \*Participants must be 21 or over.

Re: Request for Attorney General Opinion

We as the governing body of Marysville Kansas have an obligation of transparency. On June 28, 2021 the governing body passed Ordinance 1900 amending Ordinance 1891, Section 2. Ordinance 1900 further adds "Specifically, Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 9 is repealed."

The Council was told that because there was some "error" in Charter Ordinance No. 18 was the reason for amending Ordinance 1891.

The State of Kansas Constitution, Article 12, Section 5(c)(4) is very clear "Each charter ordinance enacted shall control and prevail over any prior or subsequent act of the governing body of the city and <u>may be repealed or amended only by charter ordinance</u> or by enactments of the legislature applicable to all cities."

Charter Ordinances can be repealed or amended only by Charter Ordinance. Our governing body has not complied. If there is a defect or error in Charter Ordinance No. 18, then the Kansas Constitution allows us to repeal or amend by way of Charter Ordinance only. Failing to comply is a direct violation of the State Constitution Article 12, Section 5(c)(3) that provides the electors the right to file a petition requesting the ordinance be submitted to a vote of the electors.

If Charter Ordinance No. 18 is incorrect or incomplete, we have the ability to repeal or amend Charter Ordinance No. 18. We cannot just pretend that we complied with the State Constitution. We are obligated to comply.

When the governing body passed Charter Ordinance No. 18 <u>if</u> the intent was to repeal Charter Ordinance No. 9, it failed to do so. K.S.A. 12-3004 and Marysville City Code 1-109 make it very clear that the ordinance must contain the sections that are being amended and/or repealed. Charter Ordinance No. 18 contains nothing about repealing Charter Ordinance No. 9.

Passing Ordinance 1900 has created more uncertainty. Our governing body needs to know that we have acted in compliance with the State of Kansas Constitution.

I believe that we should request an Opinion from the Attorney General.

# Outline of violations in

# <u>"An Ordinance Correcting Technical Errors In Ordinance No. 1891"</u> passed by the governing body on June 28, 2021 and assigned No. 1900:

- 1. Violates the State of Kansas Constitution, Article 12, Section 5(c)(4)
- 2. Violates Marysville City Code 1-108
- 3. Violates Marysville City Code 1-109
- 4. Violates Ordinance No. 1891
  - The Constitution of the State of Kansas, Article 12, Section 5(c)(4) states "Each Charter ordinance enacted shall control and prevail over any prior or subsequent act of the governing body of the city and <u>may be repealed or</u> <u>amended only by charter ordinance</u> or by enactments of the legislature applicable to all cities."

The June 28<sup>th</sup> Ordinance No. 1900, Section 1 includes repealing Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 9, which is clearly prohibited by the State Constitution. Any repeal of Charter Ordinance No. 9 would have to be done by a Charter Ordinance to comply with State law.

2. The Marysville City Code also controls requirements for Charter Ordinances. Marysville City Code 1-108(a) states "Charter ordinances <u>shall be controlled</u> by Article 12, Section 5(c) of the Kansas Constitution."

Our City Code requires the governing body adhere to the Kansas Constitution. The Kansas Constitution Article 12, Section 5(c) is not ambiguous. It is very clear that a Charter Ordinance can be repealed <u>only by another Charter ordinance</u>.

 Ordinance amendments are controlled in City Code 1-109 stating "no section or sections of an ordinance shall be amended unless the amending ordinance contains the entire section or sections as amended <u>and the section or sections amended shall be repealed</u>."

The June 28<sup>th</sup> Ordinance No. 1900, Section 1 does not comply with City Code 1-109, but rather amends one ordinance (Ordinance No. 1891, Section 2) and attempts to repeal a different ordinance (Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 9). This violates Marysville City Code 1-109 and also K.S.A. 12-3004.

4. Ordinance No. 1900 violates Ordinance No. 1891.

Ordinance No. 1900 is attempting to repeal Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 9.

The May 11, 2020 Ordinance No. 1891, Section 3 states "same; <u>excepting</u> <u>certain ordinances from repeal</u>...... (n) <u>All Charter ordinances</u>"

On June 28 the governing body passed Ordinance 1900 attempting to repeal a charter ordinance and at the same time Ordinance 1891 <u>prohibits repealing</u> <u>charter ordinances</u> in "Adoption of the Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas."

# AN ORDINANCE CORRECTING TECHNICAL ERRORS **IN ORDINANCE NO. 1891.**

Whereas, Charter Ordinance No. 9 exempted the City of Marysville from the provisions of K.S.A. 14-201 relating to the appointment of City Officers by the mayor and providing for a procedure of appointing and considering mayoral appointments;

Whereas, by exempting the City of Marysville from K.S.A. 14-201 et seq, the City of Marysville is authorized to determine its procedure for appointing and considering mayoral appointments by ordinance of a general nature;

Whereas, the City of Marysville, having exempted itself from the Kansas statutes, did codify the procedure of appointing and considering mayoral appointments in the Marysville City Code by general ordinance, as provided in the enactment of Ordinance No. 1891;

Whereas, Charter Ordinance No. 18 exempted the City of Marysville from the provisions of Section 4 of 2008 House Bill No 2217 as set forth in 2008 Session Laws, Chapter 163, Section 4, as it pertains to the procedure of appointing and considering mayoral appointments and repealed by implication any prior Charter ordinance pertaining to the procedure of appointing and considering mayoral appointments;

Whereas, it is necessary and proper to correct technical errors where a potential conflict exists between ordinances of a general nature regardless of their originating source;

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS:

**SECTION 1**. Ordinance No. 1891, Section 2, shall be amended to read as follows:

All ordinances and parts of ordinances of a general nature passed prior to May 11, 2020, are hereby repealed as of the date of publication of said code, including without limitation, any procedure for appointing and considering mayoral appointments regardless of its originating source. Specifically, Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 9 is repealed.

# ORDINANCE NO. 1891

(Published in the Marysville Advocate on May 14, 2020)

# AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE CODIFICATION OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS, PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CERTAIN OTHER ORDINANCES NOT INCLUDED THEREIN, EXCEPTING CERTAIN ORDINANCES FROM REPEAL AND SAVING CERTAIN ACCRUED RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES.

#### BE IT ORDAINED by the Governing Body of the City of Marysville, Kansas:

#### Section 1. Adoption of the Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas.

The codification of ordinances of the City of Marysville, Kansas, prepared by Citycode Financial LLC, Wichita, Kansas, as set out in the following chapters, Chapters I to XVI and Appendices A and B, all inclusive, and entitled the "Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas," is hereby authorized, adopted and ordained as the "Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas." The Code is authorized by ordinance and was made in conformity with K.S.A. 12-3014 and 12-3015 and amendments thereto. Said code shall be duly certified by the City Clerk. One copy of the code shall be filed in the office of the City Clerk and shall be designated as and shall constitute the official ordinance book. Three additional copies shall be filed in the office of the city clerk and shall be designated for use by the public.

#### Section 2. Repeal of general ordinances.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances of a general nature passed prior to May 11, 2020, are hereby repealed as of the date of publication of said code except as hereinafter provided.

#### Section 3. Same; excepting certain ordinances from repeal.

In construing this ordinance, the following ordinances shall not be considered or held to be ordinances of a general nature:

(a) Ordinances pertaining to the acquisition of property or interests in property by gift, purchase, devise, bequest, appropriation or condemnation;

- (b) Ordinances opening, dedicating, widening, vacating or narrowing streets, avenues, alleys and boulevards;
- (c) Ordinances establishing and changing grades of streets, avenues, alleys and boulevards;
- (d) Ordinances naming or changing the names of streets, avenues and boulevards;
- (e) Ordinances authorizing or directing public improvements to be made;
- (f) Ordinances creating districts for public improvements of whatsoever kind or nature;
- (g) Ordinances levying general taxes;
- (h) Ordinances levying special assessments or taxes;

(i) Ordinances granting any rights, privileges, easements or franchises therein mentioned to any person, firm or corporation;

- (j) Ordinances authorizing the issuance of bonds and other instruments of indebtedness by the city;
- (k) Ordinances authorizing contracts;
- (1) Ordinances establishing the limits of the city or pertaining to annexation or exclusion of territory;

(m) Ordinances relating to compensation of officials, officers and employees of the city;

#### (n) All charter ordinances;

(o) Any appropriation ordinance or ordinances relating to a specific transfer of funds;

(p) Any zoning ordinance or ordinances changing the zoning classification of any property within the city or amending the city's zoning map;

- (q) Ordinances of a temporary nature;
- (r) Any ordinance which is special, although permanent in effect;
- (s) Any ordinance, the purpose of which has not been accomplished.

Provided, that the above enumeration of exceptions shall not be held or deemed to be exclusive, it being the purpose and intention to exempt from repeal any and all ordinances not of a general nature and general ordinances specifically excepted by this section. Ordinances which are not of a general nature shall be numbered consecutively, approved by the governing body, published, and filed with the city clerk, but such ordinances shall not be prepared for insertion in this code, nor be deemed a part hereof.

#### Section 4. Arrangement of and notations throughout the code.

The arrangement and classification of the several chapters, articles, and sections of the code adopted by section 1 of this ordinance and the headnotes and footnotes at the ends of the sections, are made for the purpose of convenience and orderly arrangement, and do not constitute a part of the ordinances, and therefore, no implication or presumption of legislative intent or construction is to be drawn thereform.

#### Section 5. Accrued rights and liabilities.

The repeal of ordinances as provided in section 2 hereof, shall not affect any rights acquired, fines, penalties, forfeitures or liabilities incurred thereunder, or actions involving any of the provisions of said ordinances or parts thereof. Said ordinances above repealed are hereby continued in force and effect after the passage, approval and publication of this ordinance for the purpose of such rights, fines, penalties, forfeitures, liabilities and actions therefor.

#### Section 6. Severability.

If for any reason any chapter, article, section, subsection, sentence, portion or part of the "Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas," or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is declared to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision will not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this code.

## Section 7. Effective date.

This ordinance shall be published in the official city newspaper and shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication of the "Code of the City of Marysville, Kansas" as provided in K.S.A. 12-3015.

# CODE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS

# **CHAPTER 1. ADMINISTRATION**

# **Article 1. General Provisions**

#### 1-108. Ordinances.

(a) The governing body shall have the care, management and control of the city and its finances, and shall pass all ordinances needed for the welfare of the city. All ordinances except charter ordinances shall be valid when a majority of all the members-elect of the city council shall vote in favor. Charter ordinances shall be controlled by Article 12, Section 5(c) of the Kansas Constitution.

(b) Where the number of favorable votes is one less than required, the mayor shall have power to cast the deciding vote in favor of the ordinance.

(c) The mayor shall have the power to sign or veto any ordinance passed by the council: Provided however, that the ordinance on which the mayor casts the deciding vote, and on appropriation ordinances, the mayor shall have no veto, and the mayor shall sign such ordinances if present at the meeting and if the mayor refuses or neglects to sign or be not present at the meeting, the ordinance shall take effect with or without the mayor's signature.

(d) Any ordinance vetoed by the mayor may be passed over the veto by a vote of three-fourths (3/4) of the whole number of councilmen elected, notwithstanding the veto: Provided that if the mayor does not sign for the approval of the ordinance or return the same with a written statement of veto setting forth such objections that the mayor may have on or before the next regular meeting of the council, the ordinance shall take effect without the mayor's signature, such fact to be endorsed by the city clerk on the ordinance and at the end of the ordinance as entered in the "ordinance book": provided further that the president of the council or acting president of the council shall have no power to sign or veto any ordinance.

#### ACCEPTANCE OF GRANT FROM CONGRESS; ORDINANCE; PREAMBLE

#### ORDINANCE

- WHEREAS, The government of the United States is the proprietor of a large portion of the lands included in the limits of the state of Kansas as defined by this constitution; and,
- WHEREAS, The state of Kansas will possess the right to tax said lands for purposes of government, and for other purposes; now, therefore,
- Be it ordained by the people of Kansas:

That the right of the state of Kansas to tax such lands is relinquished forever, and the state of Kansas will not interfere with the title of the United States to such lands, nor with any regulation of congress in relation thereto, nor tax nonresidents higher than residents: *Provided always*, That the following conditions be agreed to by congress: § 1. School sections. Sections numbered sixteen and thirty-six in each township in the state, including Indian reservations and trust lands, shall be granted to the state for the exclusive use of common schools; and when either of said sections, or any part thereof, has been disposed of, other lands of equal value, as nearly contiguous thereto as possible, shall be substituted therefor.

§ 2. University lands. That seventy-two sections of land shall be granted to the state for the erection and maintenance of a state university.

§ 3. Lands for public buildings. That thirtysix sections shall be granted to the state for the erection of public buildings.

§ 4. Lands for benevolent institutions. That seventy-two sections shall be granted to the state for the erection and maintenance of charitable and benevolent institutions.

§ 12. Assessment and taxation of land devoted to agricultural use. Land devoted to agricultural use may be defined by law and valued for ad valorem tax purposes upon the basis of its agricultural income or agricultural productivity, actual or potential, and when so valued such land shall be assessed at the same percent of value and taxed at the same rate as real property subject to the provisions of section 1 of this article. The legislature may, if land devoted to agricultural use changes from such use, provide for the recoupment of a part or all of the difference between the amount of the ad valorem taxes levied upon such land during a part or all of the period in which it was valued in accordance with the provisions of this section and the amount of ad valorem taxes which would have been levied upon such land during such period had it not been in agricultural use and had it been valued, assessed and taxed in accordance with section 1 of this article.

§ 13. Exemption of property for economic development purposes; procedure; limitations. (a) The board of county commissioners of any county or the governing body of any city may, by resolution or ordinance, as the case requires, exempt from all ad valorem taxation all or any portion of the appraised valuation of: (1) All buildings, together with the land upon which such buildings are located, and all tangible personal property associated therewith used exclusively by a business for the purpose of: (A) Manufacturing articles of commerce; (B) conducting research and development; or (C) storing goods or commodities which are sold or traded in interstate commerce, which commences operations after the date on which this amendment is approved by the electors of this state; or (2) all buildings, or added improvements to buildings constructed after the date on which this amendment is approved by the electors of this state, together with the land upon which such buildings or added improvements are located, and all tangible personal property purchased after such date and associated therewith, used exclusively for the purpose of: (A) Manufacturing articles of commerce; (B) conducting research and development; or (C) storing goods or commodities which are sold or traded in interstate commerce, which is necessary to facilitate the expansion of any such existing business if, as a result of such expansion, new employment is created.

(b) Any ad valorem tax exemption granted pursuant to subsection (a) shall be in effect for not more than 10 calendar years after the calendar year in which the business commences its operations or the calendar year in which expansion of an existing business is completed, as the case requires.

(c) The legislature may limit or prohibit the application of this section by enactment uniformly applicable to all cities or counties.

(d) The provisions of this section shall not be construed to affect exemptions of property from ad valorem taxation granted by this constitution or by enactment of the legislature, or to affect the authority of the legislature to enact additional exemptions of property from ad valorem taxation found to have a public purpose and promote the general welfare.

#### Article 12.—CORPORATIONS

§ 1. Corporate powers. The legislature shall pass no special act conferring corporate powers. Corporations may be created under general laws; but all such laws may be amended or repealed.

§ 2. Liability of stockholders. § 4. Rights of way; eminent domain. No

right of way shall be appropriated to the use of any corporation, until full compensation therefor be first made in money, or secured by a deposit of money, to the owner, irrespective of any benefit from any improvement proposed by such corporation.

§ 5. Cities' powers of home rule. (a) The legislature shall provide by general law, applicable to all cities, for the incorporation of cities and the methods by which city boundaries may be altered, cities may be merged or consolidated and cities may be dissolved: Provided, That existing laws on such subjects not applicable to all cities on the effective date of this amendment shall remain in effect until superseded by general law and such existing laws shall not be subject to charter ordinance.

(b) Cities are hereby empowered to determine their local affairs and government including the levying of taxes, excises, fees, charges and other exactions except when and as the levying of any tax, excise, fee, charge or other exaction is limited or prohibited by enactment of the legislature applicable uniformly to all cities of the same class: Provided, That the legislature may establish not to exceed four classes of cities for the purpose of imposing all such limitations or prohibitions. Cities shall exercise such determination by ordinance passed by the governing body with referendums only in such cases as prescribed by the legislature, subject only to enactments of the legislature of statewide concern applicable uniformly to all cities, to other enactments of the legislature applicable uniformly to all cities, to enactments of the legislature applicable uniformly to all cities of the same class limiting or prohibiting the levying of any tax, excise, fee, charge or other exaction and to enactments of the legislature prescribing limits of indebtedness. All enactments relating to cities now in effect or hereafter enacted and as later amended and until repealed shall govern cities except as cities shall exempt themselves by charter ordinances as herein provided for in subsection (c).

(c) (1) Any city may by charter ordinance elect in the manner prescribed in this section that

the whole or any part of any enactment of the legislature applying to such city, other than enactments of statewide concern applicable uniformly to all cities, other enactments applicable uniformly to all cities, and enactments prescribing limits of indebtedness, shall not apply to such city.

(2) A charter ordinance is an ordinance which exempts a city from the whole or any part of any enactment of the legislature as referred to in this section and which may provide substitute and additional provisions on the same subject. Such charter ordinance shall be so titled, shall designate specifically the enactment of the legislature or part thereof made inapplicable to such city by the adoption of such ordinance and contain the substitute and additional provisions, if any, and shall require a two-thirds vote of the members-elect of the governing body of such city. Every charter ordinance shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the official city newspaper or, if there is none, in a newspaper of general circulation in the city.

(3) No charter ordinance shall take effect until sixty days after its final publication. If within sixty days of its final publication a petition signed by a number of electors of the city equal to not less than ten percent of the number of electors who voted at the last preceding regular city election shall be filed in the office of the clerk of such city demanding that such ordinance be submitted to a vote of the electors, it shall not take effect until submitted to a referendum and approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon. An election, if called, shall be called within thirty days and held within ninety days after the filing of the petition. The governing body shall pass an ordinance calling the election and fixing the date, which ordinance shall be published once each week for three consecutive weeks in the official city newspaper or, if there be none, in a newspaper of general circulation in the city, and the election shall be conducted as elections for officers and by the officers handling such elections. The proposition shall be: "Shall charter ordinance No.

\_\_\_\_\_, entitled (title of ordinance) take effect?" The governing body may submit any charter ordinance to a referendum without petition by the same publication of the charter ordinance and the same publication of the ordinance calling the election as for ordinances upon petition and such charter ordinance shall then become effective when approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon. Each charter ordinance becoming effective shall be recorded by the clerk in a book maintained for that purpose with a statement of the manner of adoption and a certified copy shall be filed with the secretary of state, who shall keep an index of the same.

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(4) Each charter ordinance enacted shall control and prevail over any prior or subsequent act of the governing body of the city and may be repealed or amended only by charter ordinance or by enactments of the legislature applicable to all cities.

(d) Powers and authority granted cities pursuant to this section shall be liberally construed for the purpose of giving to cities the largest measure of self-government.

(e) This amendment shall be effective on and after July 1, 1961.

# **Charter Ordinance No. 9**

A CHARTER ORDINANCE MODIFYING SECTION 5 OF CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 8 WHICH EXEMPTED THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, KANSAS, FROM THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 14-201 RELATING TO THE APPOINTMENT OF CITY OFFICERS AND PROVIDED SUBSTITUTE AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS OF THE SAME SUBJECT.

Section 1. The City of Marysville, by virtue of the power vested in it by Article 12, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, hereby modifies Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 8 which exempted the City of Marysville from the provisions of K.S.A. 14-201 relating to the appointment of City officers and provided substitute and additional provisions on the same subject.

- Section 2. Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 8 is hereby amended to read:
- Section 5. Appointments:
  - (a) The Mayor shall appoint by and with the consent of not less than 5 affirmative votes of the Council, a city, clerk, city marshal-chief of police, and city administrator. These officers so appointed and confirmed shall hold their office for an indefinite period of time and until their successors are appointed and qualified. Officers so appointed may be terminated at any time, with cause, and as provided by Chapter 1, Article 7, of the City Code, upon 5 affirmative votes of the council members. The City Clerk, City Marshal-Chief of Police and City Administrator holding office at the time of passage of this ordinance shall be retained in office and the provisions here before stated shall subsequently apply.
  - (b) The Mayor shall appoint, by and with the consent of the council, a municipal judge of the municipal court and city attorney and may appoint any other officers deemed necessary or as provided by ordinance. Officers so appointed and confirmed shall hold their offices for a term of one year and until their successors are appointed and qualified. The governing body may, by ordinance, specify the duties and compensation of an officer and may, by ordinance, abolish an office created by them whenever they may deem it expedient.
  - (c) The governing body may maintain a licensed professional engineer to act in the capacity of city engineer for specifically defined duties and provide for reasonable compensation for the services rendered.
- Section 3. Section 5 of Charter Ordinance No. 8 is hereby repealed.

The governing body of the city shall approve such appointment unless the governing body makes a specific finding by the passage of a resolution that the person is either unqualified to hold the office or is not fit to hold the office or position.
